





JNC Initiative Key Points



- Jobs do not create jobs, businesses do. Small businesses employ 80% of all Americans and created 80% of all new jobs this decade.
- JNC will focus on mass-producing small businesses with emphasis on the demographics with the highest need and potential: women, minorities, new workforce entrants and other hopefuls.
- JNC will tailor its business and job creation efforts across all North Carolina's urban and rural communities according to their willingness to participate and their business and job creation needs.
- North Carolina per capita income is below national average with exception of Raleigh all four counties and all four cities that Jobenomics has visited are below or well below the national average.
- JNC will implement Jobenomics Community-Based Business Generators in interested communities to (1) fill currently open jobs, (2) exploit emerging high-growth areas, such as energy and digital economy, and (3) start highly-scalable business creation initiatives, such as direct-care, urban mining, shared-mobility, demolition/construction, light manufacturing and service-related businesses.




















